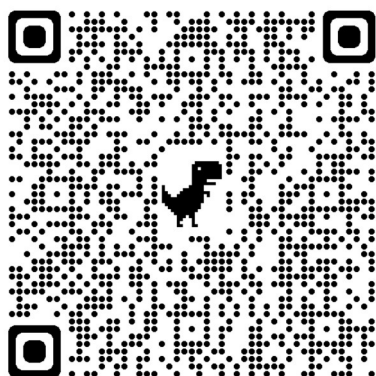

As with most other areas, road safety is something in which we can improve upon in our rural communities. Action –

- As we enter the spring months, members of the Holderness Policing Team will continue to be out and about policing our roads to promote safe behaviour and enforcement of traffic laws.
- Officers will continue to support Bilton & Aldbrough Primary Schools to reduce traffic in the villages and encourage families to walk or cycle to school.

- Create a culture of road safety where individuals understand and practices safe behaviours.



Seasonal Trend Calendar activities are:

1. Tackling Vehicle Crime

This period is always one of our busiest, however, we would like to offer reassurance to residents and a stark reminder to those intent of causing harm or committing offences, that we are out in force and ready to act against anyone involved in vehicle crime.

UPDATE - During February, reports of vehicle crime fell to two reports.

Action - aims to:

- reduce vehicle related crime.
- raise awareness within the local community about vehicle security.
- provide crime prevention advice to community members.



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Intended outcome:

The intended outcomes are to:

- reduce the number of recorded crimes related to Theft from Motor Vehicles (TFMV)
- enhance security measures to protect the registered keeper.

2. Preventing Residential dwelling Burglaries.

This period is always one of our busiest, however, we would like to offer reassurance to residents and a stark reminder to those intent of causing harm or committing offences, that we are out in force and ready to act against anyone involved in vehicle crime.

UPDATE - During February, there were no reports of burglary.

Action - aims to:

- reduce burglary related crime.
- raise awareness within the local community about property security.
- provide crime prevention advice to community members.

Intended outcome:

The intended outcomes are to:

- reduce the number of recorded crimes related to Burglaries.
- enhance security measures to protect residents.

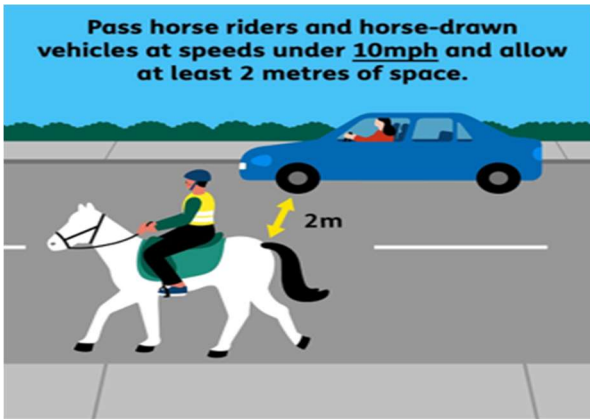

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Overtaking when driving or cycling

You may cross a double-white line if necessary (provided the road is clear) to overtake someone cycling or riding a horse if they are travelling at 10 mph or less (Rule 129).

There is updated guidance on safe passing distances and speeds for people driving or riding a motorcycle when overtaking vulnerable road users, including:

- leaving at least 1.5 metres (5 feet) when overtaking people cycling at speeds of up to 30mph, and giving them more space when overtaking at higher speeds
- passing people riding horses or driving horse-drawn vehicles at speeds under 10 mph and allowing at least 2 metres (6.5 feet) of space

- allowing at least 2 metres (6.5 feet) of space and keeping to a low speed when passing people walking in the road (for example, where there's no pavement)
- Wait behind them and do not overtake if it's unsafe or not possible to meet these clearances.



On the school Run or having a day out with the family?

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Make sure you dispose of your waste legally when hiring a waste carrier to take away your belongings! Follow the S.C.R.A.P code to keep yourself safe from rogue waste carriers.

The S.C.R.A.P. code is a UK fly-tipping prevention guideline (Suspect, Check, Refuse, Ask, Paperwork). It advises verifying waste carriers' licences, obtaining receipts, and ensuring proper disposal.

S.C.R.A.P. Code (Fly-Tipping Prevention)

- **S**uspect: Assume unexpected offers to take waste are illegal.
- **C**heck: Verify the waste carrier's license on the Environment Agency website.
- **R**efuse: Say no to unexpected, cold-called waste removal offers.
- **A**sk: Ask what will happen to your waste and demand evidence.
- **P**aperwork: Obtain a full receipt and waste transfer note.

And remember the council operates a bulky waste collection for any household item that cannot be disposed of in any of your wheelie bins, such as furniture and household electrical items.



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Enjoy our countryside and make it safe for everyone.

We are highlighting the dangers of dogs being walked off their leads, particularly during lambing season and are reminding everyone that sheep worrying is a criminal offence that can lead to fines of up to £1,000.

Every year, sheep and lambs are chased and sometimes killed by dogs that are let off their leads in rural areas. Large financial losses are often suffered by farmers as a result, and it leads to distressed and often aborted lambs.





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We are proud to announce that Humberside Police has become the first police force in the North of England to introduce contextualised safeguarding assessments across hotels in the region, reinforcing our commitment to tackling child sexual exploitation and protecting vulnerable people.

The forcewide rollout follows Sexual Violence and Sexual Abuse Awareness Week earlier this month, during which a number of local hotels took part in the assessment process. These assessments support hoteliers to identify potential risks and strengthen measures to safeguard their premises from individuals who may attempt to use them to facilitate offending.

As part of this work, we are working closely with The Children's Society, further strengthening the force's preventative approach and ensuring best practice is embedded through specialist support, guidance, and training.

All findings from the assessments contribute to the national intelligence picture, enhancing our understanding of emerging risks and supporting ongoing prevention work under Operation Makesafe.

Detective Sergeant Jenny Rayworth from our Child Sexual Exploitation team said: "Contextualised safeguarding assessments are a vital tool in helping us work with partners, businesses, and our communities to identify risk and prevent exploitation.

"Our partnership with The Children's Society reinforces this commitment, and we are proud to be leading the way in the North by introducing these assessments to protect children and vulnerable people."
